Rochester will play Newark on May 6, 7, 8, and 9th.

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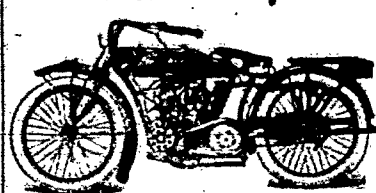
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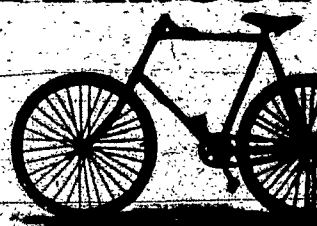
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
