The First One

While the bigots were shouting themselves black in the face in denunciation of Catholics as slaves of the Pope and therefore unable to fulfill their duties as true Americans, the first blood shed at Vera Cruz when the American mariners were landed to enforce President Wilson's ultimatum that the Stars and stripes must be respected, Americans must not be molested in Mexico, was not that of a "Guardian of Liberty" but that of a gallant young Irish Catholic, Daniel Aloysius Haggerty, of New England.
