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**Charity Guild Covers City**

Bishop Tells Why It is Deserving of General Support.

Miss Jessie Mingos, John Adams Warner and the Doussanbach Orchestra are to give a concert in Convention Hall next Monday night to raise money for the purposes that all indorse. The proceeds of the entertainment will go to the Catholic Guild of St. Mary's Hospital. That the concert will be of a high order of merit is certain, and in addition to the delight the musicians will give them, those attending will be conscious of having helped worthy institutions. Speaking of the aims of the Catholic Charity Guild, Bishop Hickey said:

"The guild reaches out to every parish and is thus city-wide in scope, touching the lives of every nationality, and establishing a common bond between them all. The injection of Christ not to let the left hand know what the right hand is doing, by helping the worthy poor, but without in any way compromising them from publicity, is strictly adhered to.

"At the same time the guild is classified and established in its departments according to the most modern ideas of the worthy poor and distressed of our times. It aims to help all whom it touches to help themselves by inculcating self-reliance and by pointing out through advice the ways and means of a successful life.

"Thus it is that the giving of temporary relief is well understood by all volunteer workers, to be by no means the principal motive of their charitable work. Their personal helpfulness and assistance by advice and counsel, their frequent visits, and words of encouragement—in a word, their personal service, as fellow human beings, with a deep and earnest love for suffering humanity, is the supreme thing sought for in the sweet cause of charity.

"It is because such motives appeal to multitudes of men and women who are blessed with means, and at once touch all the springs of charity in man's complex nature, that an organization like the Catholic Charity Guild, goes before the public with confidence, to seek the means necessary to carry on its glorious work."
