Cathedral.

Announcement was made Sunday of the solemn service of ordination to the priesthood, which will take place in the Cathedral next Saturday morning at 9 o'clock. Two of the young priests will celebrate their first mass on Sunday at the Cathedral. Rev. Mich. Daly of the diocese of Erie, Pa., will say the children's mass at 8.30 o'clock and Rev. John M. Sellinger will sing his first solemn high mass at 9.30 o'clock. Both will impart their blessing to the congregation immediately following the mass.

There was a general rehearsal Sunday afternoon of the modern miracle play, "Every soul," in Cathedral Hall, preparatory to its production by the children of the school on Wednesday evening, June 10th.
