Vacation Days

These are the days when the boys and girls are released from school, when the clerk, the office man, the professional man, the business leader, in fact all of us are thinking about "vacation."

Some of us plan trips away from home, to fish, to hunt, to pleasure away the time. Some of us think we will hie ourselves to the seashore or to the mountain resort. The fair sex rather incline to a vacation spot where they can exhibit fine toilettes and revel in summer fashions.

There are others—and their name is legion—who either cannot be spared from their business or cannot afford to lose the wages or salary incumbent upon loss of time. Especially where men are employed at a stipulated daily wage, and quite often when employed at weekly wage, the employers make no allowance for vacation time but deduct from the pay envelope for every hour not put in work.

Whether we go away from home for vacation or whether we stay at home, it cannot be denied that relaxation from routine monotony is a boon to body, brain and nerves and we return to our vocations refreshed and better fitted to perform our tasks.

Whether we stay home or go away, there is one obligation resting upon us. We cannot follow the example of our non-Catholic friends and suspend religion for the vacation period. We must assist at the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass every Sunday and holyday, no matter where we may be.

The English Cardinal

After being without representation in the Sacred College for several years the Catholics of England are honored by the elevation to the Cardinalate of Rt. Rev. Aidan Gasquet, head of the English Benedictines and President of the Papal Commission to revise the Vulgate.
