Death has again invaded the happy fireside of Mr. John Klem and claimed a devoted wife and mother. Though death came suddenly, he was met with courage and preparedness by her who lived as a devout Catholic should live.

Mrs. John Klem was one of the oldest residents of Rochester. She was born at Baden, Germany, in 1845; and at the age of two years came with her parents to Rochester, where she has resided for sixty-seven years.

Her maiden name was Seraphine Beck, and she married John Klem of this city, in 1868 at St. Joseph's church, where she has been a life-long communicant. She was a member of the Sacred Heart Altar Society and of the Arch Confraternity of the Holy Family.

She is survived by her husband John Klem; three sons, Bernard and John of Rochester, and Louis of Detroit; seven daughters, Sisters M. Frederica and Frances Clare of St. Joseph Order, Mrs. Wm. Herch, Mrs. Wm. Hoeft, Mrs. Geo. Ernst, Miss Lucy Klem of Rochester; and Mrs. Jacob Dietz of Greece, N. Y. She also leaves one sister and two brothers.

Her children and numerous relatives have the sympathy of the community in their sudden bereavement.

For many years Mrs. Klem was a patient, cheerful sufferer, and though in feeble health, discharged her various duties as wife and mother in a manner which edified all those whose lives touched hers.

The poor and needy knew her encouraging words and felt the benefits which her generosity afforded, for her hand was ever outstretched in charity. Nor was she generous only with her goods. At the call of God she sacrificed two of her daughters to serve God in holy religion.

The world is indeed blessed by the lives of Catholic mothers like that of Mrs. John Klem.
