Cliff Haven, July 17.—The arrival of Very Rev. John P. Chidwick, D. D., president of the Catholic Summer School, and the celebrations connected with the flag-raising exercises of the Albany cottage, at which the pilgrimage under the auspices of the fourth degree members of the Knights of Columbus of Albany was present, brought to a close a week which will long be remembered by the guests of the Cliff Haven institution.

Father Chidwick arrived at Cliff Haven on Saturday morning and received an enthusiastic welcome from the patrons and officers of the Summer School all of whom had been looking forward to his arrival with eager anticipation. The reverend president came on the early morning train and after a brief rest made a visitation to all the cottages on the grounds. In the afternoon he spoke to the Knights of Columbus at the flag-raising exercises, delivering a patriotic address which was a masterpiece of oratory and eloquence. At the completion of the imposing ceremonies of the flag-raising, the knights and their friends took dinner at the dining hall of the Summer School restaurant and then departed for Albany by special train.
