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New School Year Rochester Business Institute

The fifty-first school year at the Rochester Business Institute closed July 31 with a total attendance of 1,200 students, all former attendance records. Twenty-two foreign countries were represented in the enrollment—Canada, Cuba, E. A., Denmark, Porto Rico and Spain.

One hundred and seventeen commercial students attended the school during the year to study commercial subjects, get a knowledge of the best methods of teaching and special instruction this class required was given with work in the regular departments of the school.

During the year there were nearly a thousand graduates of the school for positions in Rochester and places outside of the city and outside of the State. A student who desired a position received the needed training from the school, the number actually employed being 636. This record would not seem to indicate a business depression, but does indicate the growing demand for trained young men and women.

One year ago our annual statement predicted that we would be 125 graduates at our Commencement, March, 1914. The actual number was 121 and the point to a graduating class of over 200 in March, 1915.

The regular Commercial, Shorthand, Stenography, Writing, Penmanship and English Departments will be in session during this month. A number of students have registered for summer sessions.
