### New School For Clyde Catholics

#### Efforts of Father Gleason Rewarded at Last.

Clyde, Aug. 19. - The new parochial school for the Catholic pupils of this village, will open August 31st. Six sisters will be in charge of the school. The new building is one of the most modern schools in this section.

The idea for a parochial school for Clyde originated with Rev. J. J. Gleason, who has worked untiringly to bring about the desired result. He has kept in close touch with the progress of the work and the construction has been under his personal supervision.

It is expected that the crowded condition of the public schools of this village will be somewhat relieved when the parochial school is opened. Many parents who are members of the Catholic church have signified their intention of taking their children from the public schools and transferring them to the new institution.

### Knights of Columbus

#### Secretary's Report Shows a Gain Last Year of 25,000

The report of the past year in the circles of the Knights of Columbus, which the Supreme Secretary read at the convention at St. Paul, shows a great increase in the ranks of the order since the last annual report.

The total membership of the Knights of Columbus on June 30th, 1914, was 328,858, of which 106,281 were insurance and 220,577 were associate members. This is an increase of 24,784, members over last year.

The order has 1,670 subordinate councils in 52 states and 5 territories. Forty-seven new councils were instituted this year.

There are in the various funds of the order the following amounts:

General Fund, \$285,607.71; Death Benefit Fund, \$773,742.05; Mortuary Reserve, \$5,013,153.24; Catholic University, \$492,043.23.

#### For Addition to Convent

Nazareth Convent and Academy filed an application for a permit for a proposed \$10,000 addition with Fire Marshal Wheeler Wednesday morning. According to the plans, the addition will be brick and stone and will be erected at Raines Pk., and Alameda St. The brick part will be one story, 55 1-2 feet long and 32 ft. wide. The frame part will be two stories, 36 feet wide and 29 feet long. The architect is Joseph H. Oberlies and the contractor, Geo. Kircher & Company.

Vicar-General Dennis J. Curran who is in charge of the diocese of Rochester in the absence of Bishop Hickey, has notified the priests of the diocese that memorial services in honor of Pope Pius X. will be held in St. Patrick's Cathedral on Sunday, and directed that similar services be held in all other churches of the diocese.

### Head of Jesuit Order Dies

Rome, Aug. 20. - Father Francis Xavier Werns, head of the Order of Jesuits and known as the "Black Pope," died here at 1.30 this morning, ten minutes after the death of Pope Pius X.

The death of Father Werns, who was 72 years of age, came suddenly, although it was known that he had not been in the best of health for a number of years.

The "Black Pope" was on terms of intimacy with Pope Pius and the latter's illness depressed him.
