### News From Ireland

The death took place on July 29 of Mrs. Julia O'Leary, principal of the Clonella Female National school. Deceased was well known in Ennisacorthy where she at one time occupied the position of teacher in the work-house schools.

The death of Mrs. Brennan, Tinnegarney, Gagnalstown, occurred on August 3.

Mrs. Ellen McClusker, widow of the late Barney McClusker, was found dead in her home at Demaglish, Belturbet, on August 1 by a man named George McAroo.

After a term of nine years at the Fishery schools, Baltimore, Rev. F. McCarthy has been transferred to Skibbereen, to the great regret of his Baltimore friends and pupils.

The death of Henry Breen, coach builder, Bantry, occurred on July 20. Besides the business of coach builder he was also engaged in a large grocery and wine and spirit business.

A verdict of death from drowning was returned in connection with the death of James Kelly, a resident of Lettermacaward whose remains were discovered on the sea shore.

Recently Madame Helen Mulligan, youngest daughter of Laurence Mulligan, J. P., Manor St., Dublin, died at the Convent of the Cross, Boscumbe, Bourne-mouth, in the eighth year of her religious profession.

Mrs. Curran, of Waterville, who was injured in a car accident, has succumbed, to her injuries.

Dr. M. F. Kenna, Blackrath, coroner for South Kildare and medical officer of the district for close on thirty years was presented with a complimentary address and handsome gift on behalf of over 300 people.

At Tenakilla, Capparoe, Nenagh, the death took place of Miss Johanna Gleeson, after a brief illness.

The interior of St. Michael's Cathedral, Springfield, Mass., has undergone a transformation the past few months, in the hands of decorators and other artisans, and now presents a beautiful appearance.

On his return from Rome, Mgr. O'Connell, Bishop of Richmond, Va., was tendered a reception by the Catholic Women's club.

A Latin school for young men and boys preparing for ordination to the priesthood has been established in San Francisco. The classes were organized August 15.

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There is great variety in granite and basket weaves showing practically all shades.

In the lighter materials are Canton crepes-wool and silk and wool weaves.

No partiality here, Germany is represented by a very extensive showing of silk and wool Satiny cords.

Most striking fancies of the year are the Roman stripes. These are chiefly in poplin and serge weaves. There is a superb showing of them here.

There are more subdued color effects in suiting stripes in softserges.

That the French are wizards in colorings is again evidenced in the two-tone checks.

Effective styles in French plaids which embrace boucle effects and soft foute serges. Both are in dark and light colorings.
