To the Enrolled Protestant Democrats of Ontario County:

Campaign To Obtain Relief For Belgians

Rev. Alphonse A. Notebaert, rector of Our Lady of Victory Church, has taken preliminary steps toward an organized campaign in Rochester to aid the starving Belgians, whose country has been devastated by the European war. Felix Notebaert, nephew of the Rochester clergyman, who has been conducting a similar campaign in Nova Scotia, is expected to arrive in this city within the coming week, when the work will assume a definite form. Clothing, canned goods, apples, potatoes and other farm products that can be conveniently shipped are particularly wanted.

Father Notebaert is already negotiating with the New York Central Railroad for the free transportation of these supplies. From letters received by Father Notebaert from personal friends and relatives, the information is gleaned that Belgian fields and harvests have been devastated and ruined, and many of the people have fled to the cities with little more than the clothing that covers them.
