More Land for Cemetery.

Section to be Laid Out at Holy Sepulchre.

Bishop Hickey is preparing to make a large addition to Holy Sepulchre cemetery. The section has been owned by the diocese for some time, but has never been laid out. It consists of about forty acres on the east side of the boulevard and east of the chapel, and adjoins the old ground, running back nearly to the river.

Bishop Hickey has engaged a landscape architect who has been laying out this section for some time, in the same general style as the rest of the cemetery grounds. It is expected to have the new ground dedicated before the end of this year.

It is estimated that nearly 45,000 Catholic dead are in the consecrated ground at Holy Sepulchre.

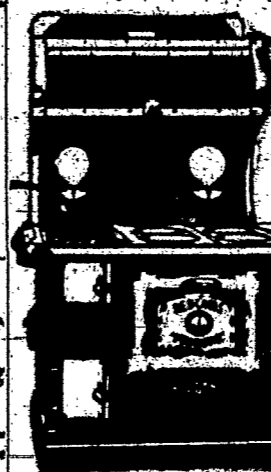
