**Local Priest Writes From Belgium**

Bishop Thomas F. Hickey has received a letter from Rev. P. Prosper Libert, professor of St. Bernard's Seminary, who is engaged in chaplain work among wounded soldiers in the town of Audenarde, Belgium, fifteen miles from the city of Ghent. Father Libert makes no mention of the war in the letter, which is dated September 26th. The censorship does not permit the sending of news of the war by members of the army. Bishop Hickey says that the writer plans to remain in Belgium till the end of the war.

The Central Council of the C. R. & B. A., held an enthusiastic meeting at the rooms of Council 59, in Concordia Hall, Thursday evening. Supreme Trustee Ham presided. After the meeting a luncheon was served. The council will hold their next meeting with Council 25, at Immaculate Conception hall on Nov. 16th.

In all of the Catholic churches last Sunday the Holy Name Societies participated in religious exercises instead of the annual parade. The feature of the ceremonies was the offering of prayers for the restoration of peace among the warring nations of Europe.

The semi-annual meeting of the council of vixers was held at Albany. Reports were made of organization of new caravans at Altoona, Pa., Youngstown, O., Binghamton, N. Y., Syracuse, N. Y., Dallas, Tex., and New Orleans.

Musa Caravan No. 25 of Rochester has organized an On-to-Louisville Club with 400 members.

The supreme council will be held at Louisville, Ky., September, 1915. Vega Caravan No. 13 of Albany will require a special train for its members.

Dr. J. H. Hemratt, recently appointed member of the New York State Council C. M. B. A., is a member of Vega Caravan and degree-staff. He was twice elected mayor of his home city, Watervliet. Governor Martin H. Glynn is also a member of Albany Caravan of some years' standing.

It was decided to erect a memorial to the Catholic women who gave their lives in the Civil War. The memorial probably will be erected at Gettysburg. A permanent committee has been appointed for this work. P. J. McNally, managing editor of the Boston Pilot, is a member.
