From a sick bed at the Monroe county jail Sheriff George R. Brown is waging his own campaign for election. Although still too weak from the effects of his recent operation to do much more than issue instructions, a number of his friends are aiding him.

Sheriff Brown had planned to make an active campaign this fall. He feels that his record in office since last March when he was appointed to fill the late Sheriff Hamill's unexpired term should commend itself to all thoughtful voters and he only wanted an opportunity to go before them and set forth his accomplishments. Coming at the time it did and in the performance of his duty his injury was particularly unfortunate.

Hundreds of people have called at the jail to express their sympathy and many Republicans have assured him of their support. It is generally conceded that Sheriff Brown will run well ahead of his ticket and his friends are confident that he will be elected.

Thousands of cards are being sent out by the sheriff's friends urging voters to support him at the polls next Tuesday.

Although he has been identified with the Axemen in their fight for control in this county the sheriff took no active part in the primary fight. He was urged to sign a Hennessy petition, but declined on the ground that it would be base ingratitude in view of the fact that Governor Gylan appointed him to his present position.

Under Sheriff Brown's administration the county has enjoyed a greater freedom from crime than at any time in years. During the summer he was particularly active in policing the lake front and the rowdism which has been rampant in other years was greatly checked. The fact that he bows to no boss and is supremely independent in his actions gives Sheriff Brown a strength which no Republican incumbent could match.
