The University of Michigan suffered an almost irreparable loss when Tommy Hughitt, plot of Yost's football squad and pronounced one of the best quarterbacks in the west, sustained injuries that may keep him out of the game for the balance of the season.

After much discussion a plan binding the West Point and Annapolis academies to play an annual Army and Navy football game for five years has been agreed on.

The plan stipulates that the two schools will choose the site for the games alternately, the Navy having the preference this year.

The game will be played this year in Philadelphia on Franklin field or Shibe park, and the Navy will also choose the site in 1916 and 1918, while the Army will make the selection in 1915 and 1917.

The University of Wisconsin regents have adopted without change the recommendation of the faculty that intercollegiate rowing contests be temporarily discontinued pending further development of intercollegiate sports.

In fourteen years the Badgers have failed to win the big varsity race at Poughkeepsie. They finished second in 1900, third in 1901, second in 1902 and third in 1903. From then until 1912 they finished in the rack, taking second place two years ago.

Thirty-five American and National league players have signed with the Federal league for next season, according to a statement made by W. T. McCullough, secretary of the Pittsburgh Federal league club.

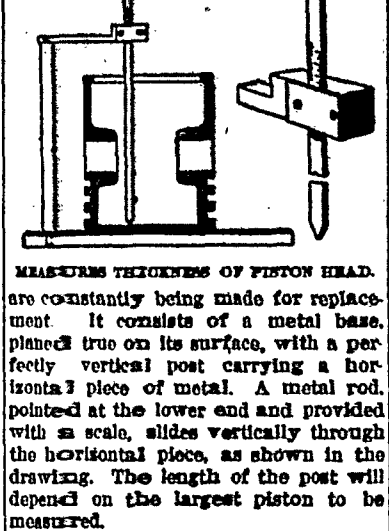
POPULAR MECHANICS

Piston Ring Faults. The almost universally used eccentric, split piston ring does not give the satisfaction that is expected of devices of the kind by modern automobile engineers, and it is interesting to note that latterly rings of other types are coming in for a greater share of attention than heretofore.

Steel Cylinders For Motors. Although the use of steel cylinders is fairly common in aeronautical work, this construction has not yet become common for motors, due probably to the high cost, says the Scientific American.

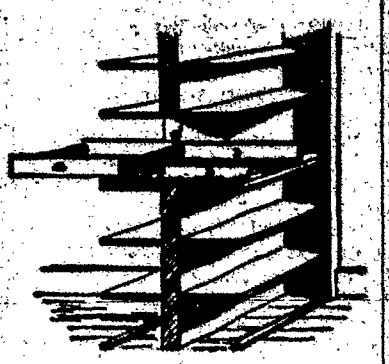

HELPFUL HINTS FOR HOUSEWIVES

Sliding Shelves Between Dining Room and Kitchen.



A device to reduce the work of handling dishes between kitchen and dining room is shown herewith. It consists of the tray a, with ends lower than the sides, which slide between it and b to prevent tipping. Rollers are shown at c. These move freely between pins placed at regular intervals from side to side of the slide.

A Good Cabbage Slaw. Choose a small, firm head of cabbage. After trimming shred very finely into a salad bowl. Over this quarter three hard-boiled eggs and season with salt and pepper to taste.

Tomato Omelet. Take three eggs, one cup strained tomato, one-quarter teaspoonful salt, dash of pepper, one teaspoonful butter or bacon fat. Beat the eggs until light and add cold water, salt and pepper.

Fried Apple Pie. Beat together an egg, a pint of sour milk, one tablespoonful of cream, a level teaspoonful of salaratus, half a cupful of sugar, salt and a little nutmeg and add enough flour to make a stiff dough.

Rice and Raisins. Cook half a cupful each of rice and raisins separately, add a little sugar to the raisins while they are cooking, and let them cook almost dry.

Scalloped Apples. Three cupfuls of chopped apples, two tablespoonfuls of butter, one-fourth of a teaspoonful of cinnamon, half a lemon (juice and rind), two cupfuls of dry bread crumbs, one-fourth of a cupful of water, one-fourth of a teaspoonful of nutmeg, half a cupful of sugar. Mix and bake in buttered baker one hour, or until the apples are tender.

Supper Tidbits. Take as many slices of streaky bacon as are required and remove the rinds. Mix together a tablespoonful of bread crumbs, a little chopped parsley, a small piece of chopped suet and beaten egg to bind.

Prune Souffle. Boil one pound of prunes until the pulp can easily be separated from the seeds. Drain, pull the fruit into fine shreds and mix with the well beaten whites of three eggs and one-half cupful of powdered sugar.

Baked Salt Mackerel. Soak a salt mackerel overnight. In the morning drain, rinse and put in a baking pan with a pint of rich milk. Bake for twenty minutes.

Football in Ceylon.

It is said of Paul von Hindenburg that he is one of the most distinguished and able military leaders of the world.

He was born in 1847. Von Hindenburg had reached the post of chief of staff of the eighth army corps in 1911 and for three years previous to the present war had lived in retirement.

General von Hindenburg received his baptism of fire in the war against Austria in 1866, in which he distinguished himself. For his valor at the battle of Königgratz, in which he served as a lieutenant, he was decorated with the order of the Red Eagle with crossed swords.
