John McCormack

Will Sing at Convention Hall Next Friday Evening.

John McCormack, the celebrated Irish tenor, who will sing next week Friday night, at Convention hall, was born on June 14th, 1884, at Athlone, Ireland. On October 5th, 1907, he made his debut at Covent Garden and has been singing in that great Opera House during each Spring season since that time. He arrived in the United States in the Autumn of 1909, as a member of the Manhattan Opera Company, under the direction of Oscar Hammerstein, and at once became one of the most popular artists in the musical world, sharing his honors with Tetrazzini, who was just then becoming well known.

The two seasons following Mr. McCormack was engaged with the Chicago-Philadelphia Grand Opera Co., and the Winter of 1912-13 he gave ten guest performances with the Boston Grand Opera Company.

At the end of January, 1912, he began a short concert tour in America, followed by a long tour in the season of 1912-13. During this season he filled 70 engagements, breaking all records in the musical world. The Fall and early Winter of 1913 was spent in Australia, where he gave 19 concerts in Melbourne and 20 in Sydney, to a capacity business. He returned to the United States, February 2d, 1914, and gave 44 concerts from Victoria to New York.
