Interesting Budget of Happenings Gathered by Our City Reporter

St. Boniface

On last Sunday afternoon, the Rosary Society recited the Rosary and offered special prayers for their late deceased member, Mrs. Elizabeth Hettig.

The regular meeting of the delegates of the Federation of Catholic Societies which was postponed last Sunday, will take place Sunday, Mar. 28th, at St. Joseph's Hall, Franklin St. The St. Boniface delegates are requested to report at above meeting at 8 o'clock. The next mass meeting and final lectures of the series will be on April 11th at St. Michael's parish hall. A prominent and efficient speaker is promised for this occasion.

Confessions will be heard on Thursday afternoon and evening for the first Friday of the month.

The regular meeting of the Sacred Heart Society will be held on next Sunday afternoon.

The Holy Name Society will hold their regular meeting on Sunday evening at 7 o'clock at our parish hall. Our pastor, Father Boppel, moderator of the society, and other speakers will address the members.

The Bowling League of the St. Boniface Young Men's Club is creating a wide interest among the local pinners. The winter tournament is drawing to a close and at the final ring of the curtain, it is expected that the new champion pin artists will loom up like shining stars, among whom will be distributed a fine number of valuable trophies. The Board of Directors have announced that the club rooms would be closed on Good Friday.

Our school will close on Wednesday morning, and reopen the following Wednesday April 7th. It is hoped that the pupils will, during this period, attend the services and devotions as often as possible, and as frequently as time will permit, especially on Good Friday and Holy Saturday.

Prayers that peace be restored to the nations now in conflict were offered at our church, as well as in every diocese outside of Europe, on last Sunday. After the high mass, the Blessed Sacrament was exposed and remained so until after the evening services. Special peace services were held in the afternoon.

The Holy Name Society, Young Ladies' Sodality and other societies attended the devotions in a body at the different specified hours. In the evening at 7.45 o'clock the closing devotions were held at which time a leaflet printed in both English and German, containing special prayers for peace, were distributed. It was very edifying to witness such large numbers to receive holy communion and attend the services, as took place at our church on last Sunday.

Last Sunday being Passion Sunday, the crucifixes and statues were veiled in purple. Sunday being Palm Sunday, the masses will be the same as usual. Immediately before the high mass at 10.30 o'clock the palms will be blessed and distributed.

In the Knights of St. John Bowling League, the St. Boniface Commandery on last Monday evening met and defeated their opponents, the St. Theodore Commandery, taking all 3 points. The St. Boniface Knights still hold 3 game high score average in this league and have established a reputation among the champion bowlers of the city.
