

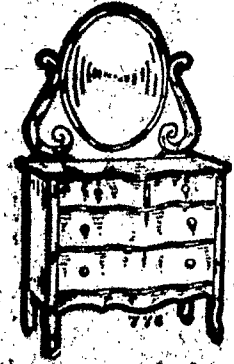
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New Catholic Charity League For Men

Plans embracing a wide scope in the field of charity were outlined and organization work was given a good start at a meeting of the executive and membership committees of the recently formed Men's Catholic Charity League in St. Joseph's parish hall in Franklin St., Sunday afternoon. Bishop Thomas F. Hickey presided and made the principal address. He explained the purpose of the new organization, which, he said, will hold an important position in the church's work in the city. "We have continually grown in our city conditions of business, social and family life that need our attention," said Bishop Hickey. "There are ill-timed marriages, sin, dissensions and quarrels. There are ungrateful children and forgetful parents. There is drink, sickness and poverty. We are prepared to meet the social conditions of our people and to care for them under the direction of their own church. But I have always held that the city and county officials should do their duty in behalf of the worthy poor." The following officers were elected at the meeting: President Peter A. Vay; vice president, Frank J. Hone; secretary, Frank Yawman; treasurer, John Connors. It was announced that \$528 was collected in membership dues at the meeting. Following the transaction of business, short addresses were made by Mr. Vay and Mr. Hone. A Catholic colony of 80 Austro-Hungarian families will be established this year five miles from La Junta, Colo. The Bishop's house at Des Moines took fire recently and was considerably damaged. The orphans of the Church in our country are cared for in 284 orphanages. In St. Vincent de Paul's church, close to the Panama Exposition, a noon-day Mass will be celebrated on Sundays. A club house for the Catholic young men of Menasha, Wis., is to be erected. The Holy Father received for the earthquake sufferers about \$100,000.
