The fair held for the church was a great success.

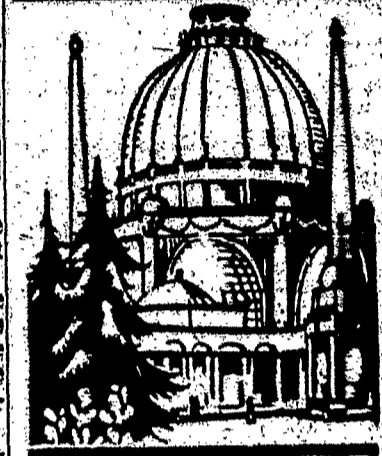
