Swing, is still a fixture.

Rev. Father J. A. Campbell, the

TWOSCORE AND TEN YEARS AGO.

Fifty years ago the great strug-
gle for our national existence, to
which so many heroes gave
their lives and those who died
later their best days, was ended
in victory.

We do not rejoice because of
the victory of the north over the
south, but because of the vic-
tory which marked the last step
in the governmental progress of
the human race and demonst-
rated that men can govern them-
selves.

We meet on Memorial day at
the graves of those who died in
the days of strife and of those
who survived that struggle and
yet have reached their last rest-
ing place the bivouac of the
dead.

Upon them the government
leaned as upon pillars of safety.
In the days when they might
have been preparing for the fu-
ture struggles of life they were
serving their country; they were
fighting her battles; they were
doing their duty as patriots in
striving for the advance of the
human race.

Amid the roar of artillery, the
crashing of shells, the malicious
whisperings of the little minie,
the gleaming bayonets and flash-
ing sabers they bore the shock
of battle in defense of their
country. Aye, more than that,
their heroism and the heroism
of their comrades through four
years of bloody strife lifted their
country high among the nations
of the earth, where she stands
today, the sovereign of them all.

Twoscore and ten years ag-
o the tramp of armed hosts hom-
eward bound was heard through-
out the length and breadth of
our land. Guns were stacked,
ranks were broken and then be-
gan another march, the march of
citizens who had left behind
them the tented field, to their
homes and the boundless, unpeo-
pled west, where they and their
descendants yet live and add to
the strength and patriotism of
our great commonwealth.
