

**Gaelic Association Outlines  
Next Season's Work.**

At the annual June party of the Gaelic Literary and Musical Association held at the Conservatory of music, a program was outlined for the coming year.

The season will open in October and the president, D. C. Ryan, has already been promised the assistance of some new members in the Dramatic class. He informed the members that instructions would be given in the new and modern dances and contemplates a means of having dramatic aspirants receive some instruction in elocution.

It is proposed that, as soon as practicable, the Association will seek affiliation with the main body of the Gaelic League in Ireland.

The regular meetings will be held on Friday evenings during the coming season.

**Bishop Hickey in Phelps.**

Phelps, June 15. — Right Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, bishop of the diocese of Rochester, yesterday conferred the rites of confirmation on a class of seventeen boys and nineteen girls in St. Francis Church, of which Rev. M. T. Madden is pastor. Clergymen in the sanctuary were the pastor, Rev. Father Madden, Fathers Brophy, Nelligan and Burns of Rochester; Rev. Fathers McDonald and Doud of Geneva, and O'Hanlon and Ryan, of Clifton Springs.

**Good Work of a Bishop.**

Two important propositions were brought before the Maine legislature during the past winter by the Right Rev. Bishop Walsh of Portland, one looking to the sanctity and security of the Christian family, the other to obtain for Catholic schools a just and equitable division of the school funds.

The first measure was enacted by the legislature and approved by the Governor, and is now a law. The proposition as to an adjustment of the school question was the occasion of an extended discussion, as might be expected, but the consideration accorded free from those feelings of bias generally to be expected in the consideration of this delicate subject, leaves hope that the important matter may be again taken up before some future legislature with more hope of success.

**Zeppelin Over Ireland.**

A sensation recently occurred at Athlone in the center of Ireland, when a giant Zeppelin passed over the town.

There was a great panic at first but, when instead of bombs the flying machine dropped great bundles of literature and placards marked "Greetings to Ireland," the feelings of the people can better be imagined than described. Thousands of circulars telling of the defeat of the English, the "destruction of almost one-third of the cream of her battleships," the "defeat of the allies at the Dardanelles" and "the revolt in India" were showered all over the district and elsewhere toward the West Coast. The police and military authorities made a wild rush to seize the literature before it got to the people, but it was nearly all promptly circulated and carried away to various parts.

**Pope Gives Palace.**

Besides having the Hospice of Santa Maria, an annex of the Vatican, converted into a hospital for wounded Italian soldiers, Pope Benedict has ordered that his palace at Castel Gandolfo be opened for the same purpose. It will be in charge of the Knights of Malta.

The Jesuit Order has offered its colleges throughout the country for the service of the hospital corps, and scores of noblemen have offered their places.

**Bishop Kennedy of  
American College Promoted.**

Rome, June 14 — The Pope has promoted Bishop Thomas F. Kennedy, rector of the American College, to be titular archbishop of Seleucia.

Archbishop Kennedy is a native of Pennsylvania and has been in charge of the American College since 1901. He was appointed titular bishop of Adrianopolis in 1907.

The new archbishop has been talked of at various times as a possible addition to the list of American cardinals and also was mentioned as a possible successor to Archbishop Ryan as head of the archdiocese of Philadelphia. It was said at the time that he was retained in Rome at his own request.
