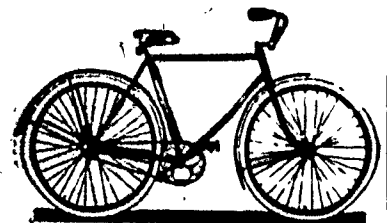

At Wyoming, Pa., the High Mass is sung by the whole congregation.

Fourteen wagons of the St. Vincent de Paul Society of Philadelphia collect newspapers, clothing and general waste to aid the summer outings of the poor children.

Rev. William A. Courtney, of St. Brendan's, New York, has been appointed by the Archbishop of New York, Cardinal Farley, as General Supervisor of Catholic Charities succeeding in that office the late Mgr. D. J. McMahon.

Work on the \$200,000 Cathedral of Sioux Falls will begin shortly.

In St. Patrick's Cathedral, New York, 1,500 United Spanish War Veterans attended their annual Memorial Service.

Stephen A. Douglas, the great statesman and Senator, was received into the Church on his deathbed by Bishop Duggan, fourth Bishop of Chicago.

In Cincinnati a Catholic boarding school for the deaf will be opened in September.

In San Francisco, seven hundred young Catholic men from Malta, are organizing a Catholic congregation.

It is estimated the 67,000 people attended the second annual Solemn Field Mass for the dead soldiers at the Philadelphia Navy Yard at League Island.

At Chilton, Wis., St. Mary's Church will cost about \$72,000.

St. Agatha's Academy, Chicago, built in 1850 will be replaced by a new hospital, the gift of Charles Haines.

The Protectorate of the Catholic Women's League, Chicago, assisted 8,205 women last year.

Brutality at the Bar. Cross examination by lawyers is much less severe today than it used to be. Chief Justice Erie, summing up, described Ballantine's cross examination as "an exhibition of brute force which I have never seen before in a court of justice and hope never to see again."

MANY USES FOR POTATO.

To clean a vinegar crust all the crust with finely chopped potato skin, cork tightly and let stand in a warm place three days, then turn the skins out and rinse the crust with warm water and borax.

To clean rusty knives use a raw potato dipped in brack dust.

To kindle fires potato parings dried in the oven are good, as they light easily.

To clean carpets grate a raw potato into a pint of cold water, strain through a sieve, add another pint of water and let it settle. Dip a sponge into the water and rub the soiled garment carefully, afterward rinsing with clear water.

To clarify drippings slice a raw potato into the fat while rendering. It will absorb all impurities.

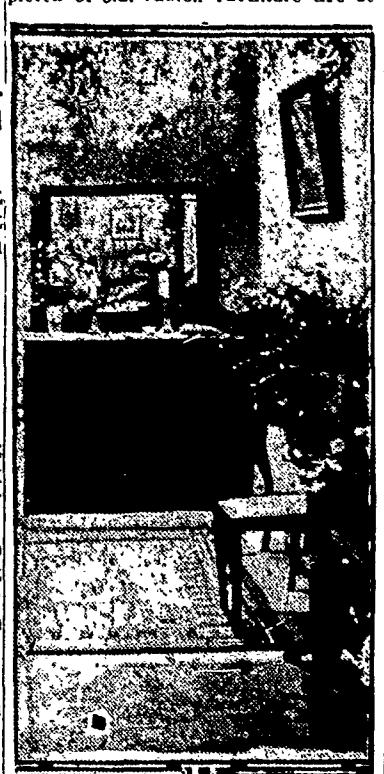
To clean silk from mud spots, after washing thoroughly rub soiled places with a raw potato.

When a fern turns yellow slice a raw potato and put it on top of the soil. This will draw out the worms.

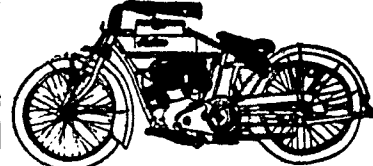

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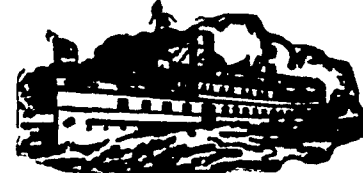

Old Time Motor Omnibus.

The type of motor omnibus first used in Paris was a steam driven vehicle, made in 1891, before the days of the gasoline autobus. A boiler and a small engine of the four cylinder type, mounted on the front of the platform, were used to drive the rear wheels by chains, and the wheels were bound with ordinary metal tires. The bus, which carried only six passengers inside and three on the top seat, made quite a sensation when operated in the suburbs of the city.—Detroit Free Press.
