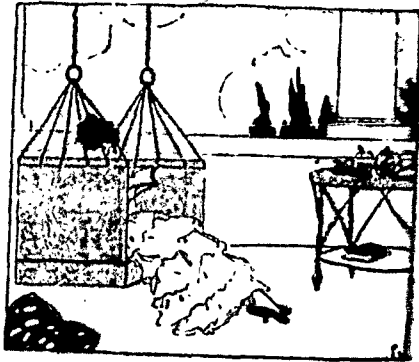

On Saturday at 8 a. m., a requiem mass will be read for Mrs. Michael Peer.

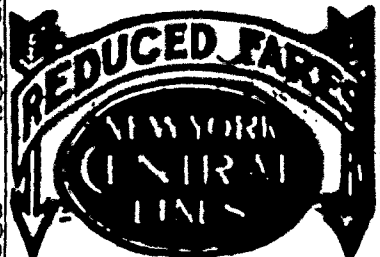
On Sunday there will be a meeting of the Rosary society.
