The requiem masses for this week were for: Ludwig Scheilhorn, John Pascale, Frank Singler and the Poor Souls.

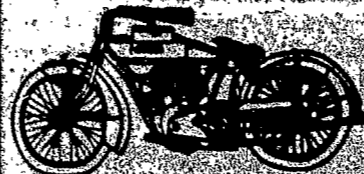
Immaculate Conception Parish.
