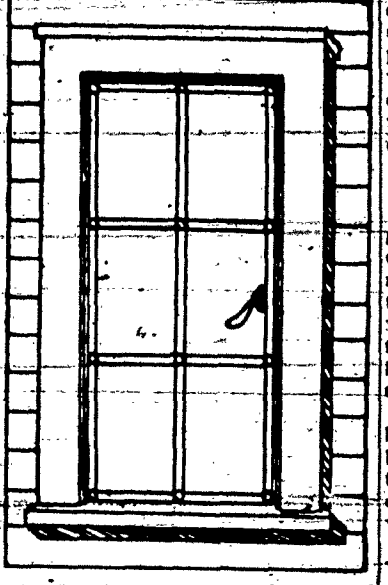

SCIENCE—INVENTION.

Effect of Impurities in Iron. All of the ordinary impurities in iron, with the exception of manganese, are electro-negative to it, which means that a current will flow from one to the other in the presence of an electrolyte.

Anthracite Coal Output. Pennsylvania produced 81,090,031 long tons (90,821,507 short tons) of anthracite in 1914, according to figures made public by the United States geological survey.

Welded Steel Casements. After considerable experimenting a metal casement has been evolved which can be used in conjunction with wood frames.

Our Sources of Lumber. The Pacific northwest now furnishes only one-sixth of the annual timber cut, though it contains practically one-half of the standing timber in the United States.

Speed and Tire Service. A set of tires on any make of car that is driven over a fairly good road at a speed of thirty-five or forty miles an hour with ordinary care will almost invariably give their guaranteed mileage plus a great deal more.

Waterproofing a Waxed Finish. A waxed finish may be effectually protected against water or other form of moisture by applying the following coating: Zanzibar copal varnish, boiled linseed oil and spirits of turpentine, six parts of each by weight.

Pure Iron Useless. Chemically pure iron is little more than a laboratory curiosity. Certainly it is not available for commercial use in building bridges and skyscrapers.

HINTS FOR THE BUSY HOUSEWIFE

Handy Device For Polishing Table Cutlery.



Ordinary washing will clean the surfaces of table ware, but to get the polish required by neat housekeepers is necessary. An implement for this purpose has recently been patented by a Philadelphia inventor and is herewith illustrated.

Fried Chicken. Clean carefully, draw and disjoint the fowl. Season well and roll each piece in flour. Brown in hot fat in an iron frying pan.

Steamed Pudding. Into a small pan put a teacupful of good molasses, one of milk, one of chopped suet, one of seedless raisins and a teaspoonful of salt.

Apple Puff. Cook half a cupful of flour in one pint of milk in a double boiler for fifteen minutes. Add a half cupful of sugar and from one to three eggs and flavor as liked.

Pumpkin Pie. To a teacupful of sifted pumpkin add half a teacupful of sugar, three table-spoonfuls of maple or any good molasses, a pinch of salt, heaping table-spoonful of cornstarch, a teacupful of ginger and a teacupful of rich milk.

Creamed Chicken. Cook a good fat hen till the flesh falls from the bones. Pick the meat into small bits, but do not chop or grind it.

Oysters and Macaroni. Cook one cupful of macaroni until tender. Butter a baking dish; fill dish with layers of macaroni and oysters alternating, seasoning each layer with butter, pepper and salt.

Leaf Cake. Sift three teacupfuls of flour with two slightly heaped teacupfuls of baking powder. Beat together a teacupful and a half of sugar, a teacupful each of butter and sweet milk, two-thirds of a teacupful of seeded raisins, a little nutmeg; then stir in the flour and beat well.

Violin Varnish. Dissolve twelve parts of sandarac, six parts of shellac, six parts of mastic, three parts of elemi gum in 150 parts of alcohol. Warm when dissolved and add six parts of Venice turpentine. Color to match the old varnish with Brazil wood and dragon's blood gum.
