NOTABLES IN THE LIMELIGHT

Prince George, Heir to the Grecian Throne.



While King Constantine of Greece and his queen, a sister to the Kaiser, have been loath to enter the war now raging in the Balkans, it is well known that Prince George, heir to the throne, is in accord with former Premier Venizelos in his sympathy with the allies.

Prince George, who is now twenty-five years of age, was born and educated in Greece. When he was eight years old his mother placed him in the German army, under the supervision of the Kaiser for the purpose of completing his military education. He was attached to the Foot guards, the Kaiser's crack regiment at Potsdam, for three years.

When the first Balkan war broke out George accompanied his father, Constantine, who was anxious to wipe out the memory of Turkey's victories in Thessaly. Fresh as he was from Potsdam, the young prince proved a brilliant soldier. His spirit and courage led him into the thick of the fight on several occasions, notably when Greece won her signal victories at Saloniki and Janina. Of all the royal personages who took the field during the two successive wars Prince George was the only one to be wounded, which made him all the more popular with the emotional Hellenes. Through his behavior in the face of the enemy and later through his open support of the war party Prince George has firmly established himself in the hearts of many of those over whom some day he will be called to rule.

Treat Ulcers With Sugar.
Sugar as a dressing for ulcers is advocated by Dr. P. M. O'Brien of Bradford, England, in a letter to the London Lancet. He says he has used it in medium sized crystals for many years, having learned of it from an old woman who was treating an ulcer on her own leg in this manner, and has found it most effective. The New York Medical Journal says that Dr. Magnus of Marburg, Germany, also uses sugar and has found it invaluable as a dressing in all severe tuberculous lesions.
