Cathedral.

At midnight, Christmas eve, "Midnight mass", a solemn high mass will be celebrated. It is customary for many Catholics of Rochester to attend. The mass will be sung by the students of St. Andrew's Seminary. The musical program is as follows:

The Gregorian Music of this Mass is sung by the students of St. Andrew's Seminary, Mr. Emmett Dougherty, first chanter.

Christmas morning, Pontifical High Mass at 10.30 o'clock. Processional, Adeste Fideles - Arranged for the students of St. Bernard's Seminary; Introitus, Puer Natus, Gregorian; Graduale, Viderunt Omnes, Metterer; Offertorium, Tu Sunt Coeli, Gregorian; Supplementary Offertory, "Cantate nuncio" from Adeste Fideles; Schubert's mass the same as at midnight; Communion, Viderunt Omnes, Gregorian. Sanctuary Choir of St. Bernard's Seminary, composed of about 300 students, directed by Rev. John M. Petter, S. T. B.

Boys' and Men's choir of 25 boys and 24 men, M. D. Kavanaugh, assistant director; Eugene Bonn, organist and director.

Christmas day at 10.30 o'clock the Pontifical high mass will be celebrated. The mass will be sung by a combined chorus of 350 voices, consisting of the students of St. Bernard's and St. Andrew's Seminaries and the Boys' and Men's choir. Bishop Hickey will impart the papal blessing at the close of the mass. Rev. Mortimer L. Nolan will preach the Christmas sermon.

Tuesday, the 21st was observed as the feast of St. Thomas the Apostle. At Cathedral Hall Bishop Thomas F. Hickey was the guest of honor at the programme given by the students of Cathedral High School. The Bishop extended a few words of thanks, wishing them and their parents a Merry Christmas.

Mr. and Mrs. John Breitung of Avenue B., are rejoicing over the advent of a son.

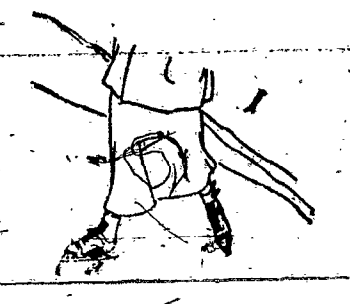
On Sunday evening at 7.30 o'clock solemn vespers and benediction will be held, it being the last Sunday in the old year.

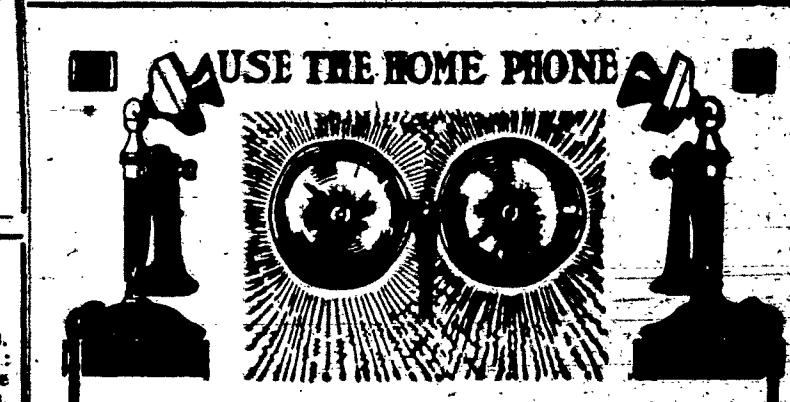
