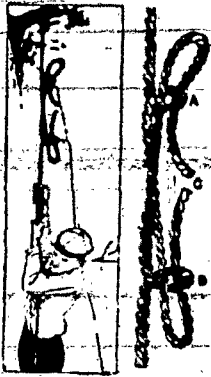
SCIENCE—INVENTION.

A Broken Piston Ring.

The engine of a car became rather uncertain in starting, and its owner suspected and verified in turn the ignition, the carburetor and the valves. The compression of each cylinder was tested in turn by feeling the resistance it offered to the rotation of the starting handle, and one cylinder proved to be almost compressionless. The engine would not start from a pull up if the starting handle claw was so engaged that the weak cylinder was either the first or second resistance to be overcome. The exploded charges blew past the broken ring into the crank case and sent puffs of smoke out through the gauze cover of the crank case breather. This usually occurs when faulty piston rings have perceptibly reduced the compression in a cylinder. In the case under notice the pistons had but one ring each, and a piece of about one-quarter inch in length had absolutely vanished from the ring of the erring cylinder, the two remaining pieces still lying in the groove. Such a puff of smoke from the crank case breather is plainly determinative and shows that the rings and not the valves are to blame.—Automobile Dealer and Repairer

Ether Cannot Be Insulated. All radio transmission is by means of electromagnetic waves in the ether, which may be defined as the universal medium surrounding and permeating all matter. A copper wire may be insulated from surrounding matter, so that electrical impulses sent along it will not spread into the surrounding space, but there is no known means of insulating any portion of the ether from any other portion. The result is that an electrical disturbance produced at any point in the ether spreads out in all directions, just as the sound of a pistol shot, or, to be exact, the disturbance in the air produced by such a shot spreads out in all directions; hence when one speaks by radio from Washington to Honolulu every word that is uttered can be heard at every point within the same distance of Washington, namely, all over the United States, Canada, Central America, the northern part of South America, the eastern part of Africa and over practically all of Europe. Of course a receiving device is required in order to hear the words at any place. Just as an ear is required to hear the sound of the pistol shot.—Engineering Magazine.

A Handy Knot to Know. The knot shown has a peculiar characteristic which enables a person to recover the rope after letting himself down from some elevated position, says Popular Mechanics. After the rope has been tied firmly to some support, as a limb of a tree, tie this knot, or sheepshank, as high up as possible.

Close inspection will show that one of the three sections of the knot holds no part of the weight below. This section is identified as the portion which projects through the loops A and B at both ends. The other sections project through at one end only. When the knot has been arranged slide down carefully to a position just below it and cut the rope at C. Then descend to the ground. By shaking the rope the knot may be loosened, and only a short piece will be left attached to the support.

Our Great Phosphate Reserve. A grave problem for the farmer is to discover the needs of his depleted or unfavorably proportioned soil. Its greatest need may be phosphoric acid, one of the three substances that are most necessary in maintaining fertility, the other two being nitrogen and potash. Phosphoric acid for use in fertilizers has been supplied for many years in part by the phosphates of Florida and Tennessee and from islands in the Pacific ocean. These deposits cannot always supply the demand, and therefore the recent discovery that the Rocky mountains contain the largest known area of phosphate rock in the world is of vital interest to future generations. If not to the present one.—United States Geological Survey

The Steering Knuckles. Very little attention is given to the matter of knuckles by the average garage man, as this part seldom gets "out of kilter," says the Automobile Dealer and Repairer. But the knuckles should as surely be looked after as the engine or the gear case. Many a car driver has come to grief by taking something for granted. Just know that a thing is so or is not so; then you are as safe as it is possible to be.

Production of Feldspar. The marketed production of feldspar in 1914 amounted to 135,410 short tons valued at \$129,873, according to the annual statement on the production of feldspar now available for distribution by the United States geological survey.

CHRISTMAS SALADS.

Delicious Combinations That the Home-comers Will Like.

Place two pieces of canned asparagus on a white lettuce leaf. Across the asparagus put two strips of sweet red pepper. Dress with French dressing, well seasoned with paprika.

Remove the top from a sweet red pepper and fill it with Camembert and cream cheese gushed together. Cut it in quarter inch slices. On each plate place a couple of lettuce leaves and on them put a thick slice of sweet, July-orange. On this place a slice of the cheese stuffed pepper. Pour French dressing over it and serve.

Put a slice of pared tart apple on a lettuce leaf and on it place a thick slice of tomato, then another slice of apple and another of tomato. Top with a spoonful of mayonnaise.

Remove the pits from dates and stuff with cream cheese. On each plate put a slice of pineapple on a lettuce leaf. Add three stuffed dates, pour French dressing over and serve.

Add chopped pecans to cottage cheese and form into small balls. Serve three or four with each service of crisp lettuce, dressed either with French or mayonnaise dressing.

On a piece of endive place alternately segments of orange from which the inner skin is removed, and similarly shaped pieces of tart apple. Dress with French dressing.

Avocados or alligator pears make a delicious salad cut in cubes and served with a well seasoned French dressing on crisp white lettuce leaves.

Three or four pieces of canned asparagus, drained and chilled, served on a lettuce leaf with French dressing, to which a chopped sweet green pepper has been added, make another good salad that is not much trouble.
