Aloysius Leo Scheid, son of Mrs. Catharine and the late Ignatius Scheid of 10 Buchan Pk., professor of modern languages in the University of Seattle and head of the athletics department of that university, died in Seattle last Saturday after an illness of several weeks.

Mr. Scheid attended St. Michael's parochial school, graduating from there June 1900. After a preparatory course, he entered Holy Cross College, Worcester, Mass. There he won honors in the class-room and athletic field and was graduated in June 1910. In his junior and senior years at Holy Cross, Mr. Scheid played on the football and baseball teams.

After leaving Holy Cross, he accepted a position as teacher in languages and athletic instructor at St. Ignatius College, Chicago, where he remained a year and then went to Sacred Heart College, Denver, Col., to take a similar work. In Denver, Mr. Scheid was very successful in his athletic works, developing championship teams in baseball and football for the local institution. In September, 1913, Mr. Scheid accepted a professorship in the University of Seattle as professor of modern languages and head of the athletics department.

Mr. Scheid was a popular member of the Seattle Council, Knights of Columbus, and an unusual courtesy has been extended by the Seattle Council in sending a delegation to accompany the re-

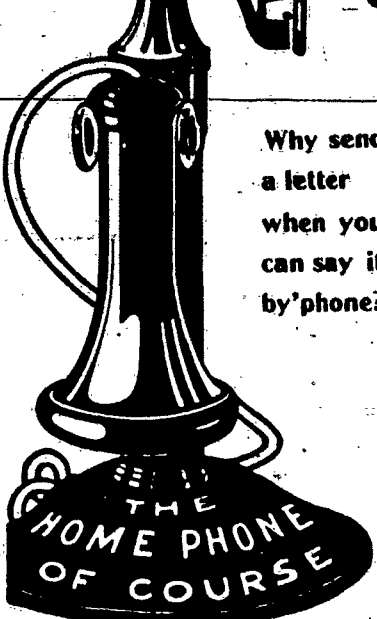
