Hospital Graduates Dine

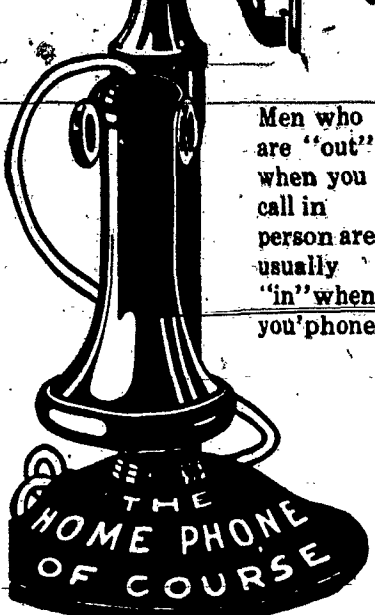
