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NOTABLES IN THE LIMELIGHT

Sir William Robertson, British Chief of Staff.



From private in the ranks to head of the armies of Great Britain is the unusual record of General Sir William Robertson, British chief of staff. Recently he was granted widely extended powers by an order in council, which directed that General Robertson be responsible for issuing all orders of the government in regard to military operations.

He was born in 1860 and enlisted in the Ninth Lancers at the age of nineteen, educating himself while a trooper. At the age of twenty-nine he received a commission in the Third Dragoon Guards. The average second lieutenant had about eight years' start on him in the army list.

Probably the most popular citizen of St. Paul is Mr. Louis W. Hill, president of the Great Northern railroad. At the great outdoor sports carnival recently held at the Minnesota capital, Mr. Hill, as president of the affair, reviewed more than 25,000 members of marching clubs.

THE NEW CAPITAL CITY OF MEXICO

Queretaro—An Important Place Historically and Industrially.

Queretaro, which was recently decreed as the new capital of Mexico for at least a year by General Carranza, is the capital of the state of Queretaro and lies 167 miles north of Mexico City. It is one of the most important cities historically and industrially in the republic. Here the first plans for independence from Spain were laid, and here were executed the Emperor Maximilian and his two chief generals, Miramon and Mejia, on June 19, 1867.

Its most famous buildings is the Turbide theater. Many of the houses are very old, but the upper part of the town is more modern. The city is known as a textile manufacturing center, and a short distance to the east of it is situated Hercules, noted as being the location of one of the largest textile mills in the country.

The Cookbook.
