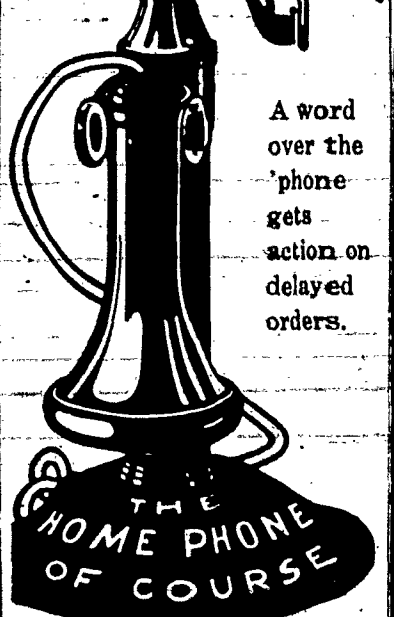
Extension of Term.
