**Sacred Drama "Blessed Thomas More," to be Repeated.**

The sacred drama, "Blessed Thomas More," which was presented at Cathedral Hall last Tuesday and Wednesday evenings proved to be such a popular entertainment that the directors have decided to give another performance next Monday evening at the Cathedral Hall. A large crowd witnessed both performances and heartily applauded the entire cast who presented their parts so nobly. Special mention must be made of Mr. Harry Crowley who so cleverly and unassumingly performed the part of "Blessed Thomas More."

The play is dedicated to the Rt. Rev. Bishop Hickey and has a large list of the best people of Rochester as patrons and patronesses. It was written by a nun of the Order of St. Joseph and portrays vividly the character of Sir Thomas More, the great English Catholic layman who has been beatified by the Church and is now called "blessed." The stage settings and costumes are most elaborate, having been furnished by a New York firm and the play is under the direction of Mr. Don C. Manning. 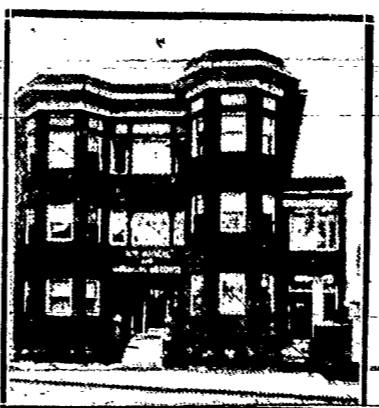
