"EXPERIENCE"

The Modern Morality Comedy Drama.

The latest morality play "Experience" comes to the Lyceum Theatre for one week commencing Monday, April 17th. This was done and the Missionaries were much impressed by the moral teachings of the play. Afterwards when "Experience" was presented outside of Boston and especially in Fall River and Providence, the Missionaries mentioned "Experience" as a play that people should see and various pastors throughout New England were so impressed that here was an instance where the Church and Theatre were working nearer together than ever before, that they also advised their Parishioners to see "Experience."

What will be especially interesting to Catholics is the fact that Youth's regeneration takes place because of his early religious training and he is turned from Crime and Degradation by the beautiful strain of Cardinal Newman's hymn "Lead, Kindly Light."

This powerful sermon found in "Experience" sternly warning against the pitfalls of life makes this attraction particularly appropriate for this season of the year.

There are 32 noted players in this New York-Boston organization and William Elliott, F. Ray Comstock and Morris Gest have given "Experience" a beautiful and brilliant production. Beside the night performances there will be a bargain matinee on Wednesday and the regular matinee on Saturday afternoon.

Holy Family.

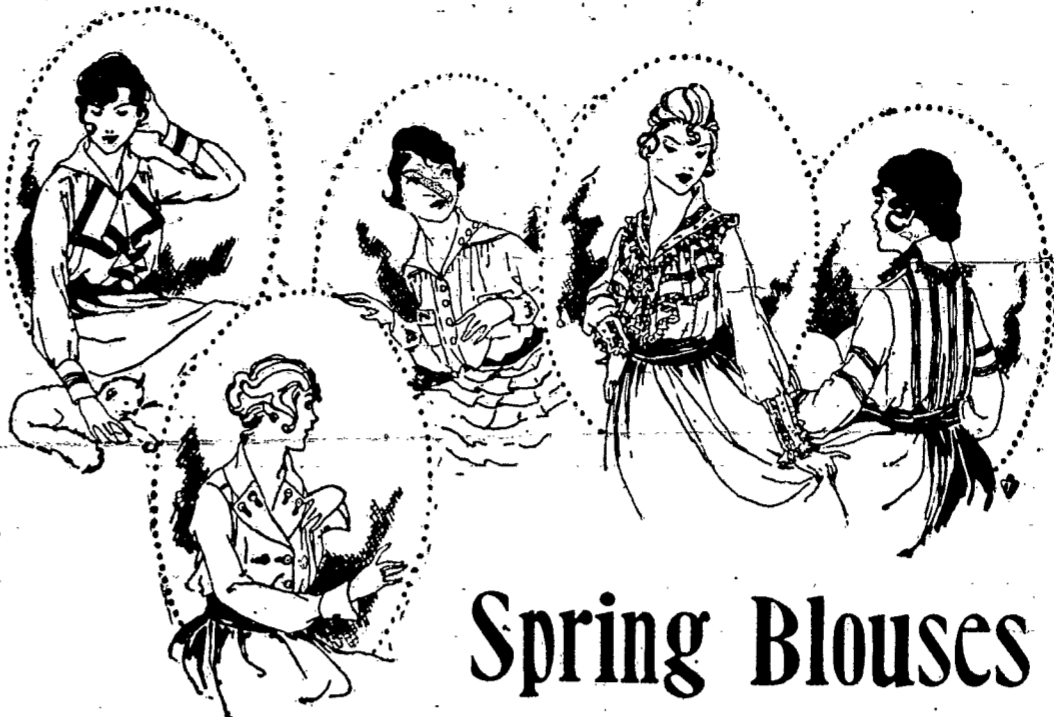
The children will receive their first Holy Communion on June 18th.

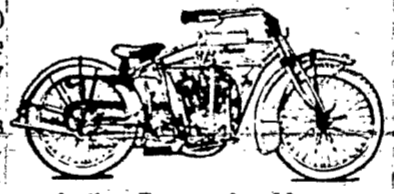

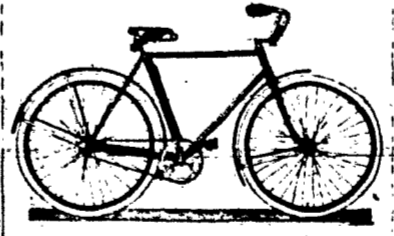
