St. Mary's Church.

The masses on Easter Sunday will be as follows: 6, 7, 8:30 9:30 Solemn High Mass at 10:45 a. m. After the mass the congregation will join in singing the hymn, "Holy God, We Praise Thy Name." Solemn vespers and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament will be held at 7:45 p. m.

The Easter collection will be taken up at all the masses next Sunday. As the proceeds of this collection will go toward defraying the expenses of a new home for the Sisters of Mercy, every one should contribute as much as possible to this worthy cause.

The regular monthly meeting of the Confraternity of Mary was held in the Church Hall last Sunday. It was decided to resume the monthly socials after Easter and the first of these socials, which are held for the members of the Society only, will be held in the Church Hall, Thursday evening, May 18th. A well trained chorus of thirty voices, resplendent in new costumes which have been designed and are being made for the occasion, will welcome the friends of St. Mary's Young Men's Association at their second annual Minstrel Show which is being produced under the direction of Mr. Joseph Kurtz and will be given in St. Mary's Church Hall, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings April 24, 25 and 26th. Judging from the large sale of tickets the young men will entertain a larger number of their friends than they did last year when they filled St. Mary's Hall three nights. With the extra seating space which has been added during the past year the Club feels that they will accommodate all who wish to attend. The Holy Name Society on last Sunday morning went to Holy Communion in a body.

The St. Boniface Young Men's Club will hold their annual banquet at the parish hall on Monday evening, May 1st. A first class caterer has been engaged to satisfy the appetites of the members. The committee have composed a number of parodies in which are involved the pedigree of the prominent members, carried to the tune of popular melodies. Good music and a number of jolly jesters will serve to make the evening an enjoyable one.

The St. Boniface Indoor Baseball Team are primed to a high degree of efficiency with their heavy artillery headed by General Joe Frank who will be on the firing line as chief gunner to explode his 12 inch bombs of cowhide into the enemy's camp. His opponent will be Leo Doer and as both have carved their name in the Hall of Fame, a battle royal is expected. The collection that will be taken up at all masses Sunday will be for the benefit of the electric lighting system and re-decorating fund of the church. All members of the parish are expected to give a suitable Easter offering.
