#### St. Boniface.

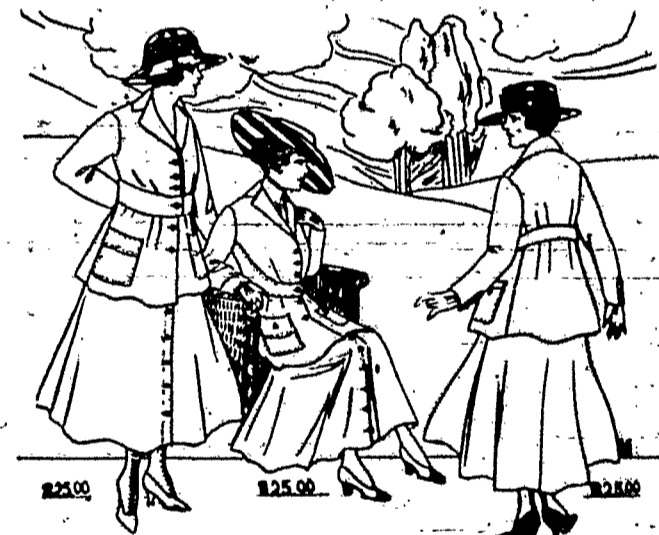
