**BIGOTRY IN BERGEN.**

Mr. Neal Denies that he Spread Anti-Catholic Literature.

The Union and Times gladly prints the following letter from George M. Neal of Bergen:

Catholic Union and Times, Buffalo, N. Y.:

Gentlemen—Your issue of May 11, 1916, contains upon the first page an article headed: "Bigotry in Bergen. Spreaders of Anti-Catholic Virus Take Hand in School Election."

The article states that I was nominated and elected a member of the school board at the recent school meeting held in Bergen, N. Y., and that "our informant states that Mr. Neal has been one of the most active spreaders of anti-Catholic literature in his town and vicinity."

The facts are that I never distributed any anti-Catholic literature, nor was I asked to do so by any one; that I was advised by Catholics in Bergen to allow my name to be used as a candidate for the office referred to; I was not present at the meeting that elected me, and, as I am informed, most of the Catholics who were present at that meeting voted for me. Further than this, I have had for two years residing in my family a Catholic girl who has been attending the high school in Bergen.

There is absolutely no foundation for the charges made in the article referred to, and I request you to publish the facts which I have given to you, as prominently as you did the article to which I refer.
