Christening Boats. The modern custom of christening vessels is without doubt an adaptation of an ancient custom.

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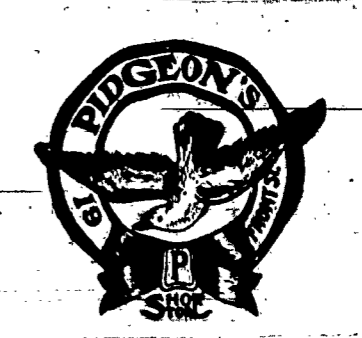
