

Bishop to Bless Graves
Ceremony at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery Next Sunday.

The annual ceremony of blessing the graves in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery will be conducted next Sunday by Bishop Hickey, assisted by the priests of the city and the students of St. Bernard's Seminary. The procession of priests, headed by the Bishop, will leave the Seminary at three o'clock.

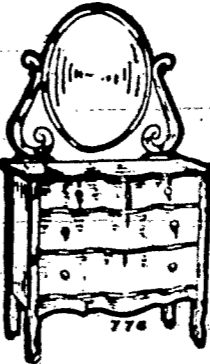

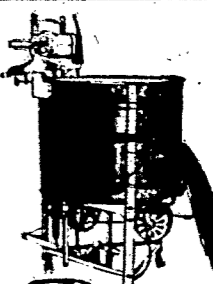


