STYLE TIPS.

SOUP'S SECRETS.

The Art of Combining and Seasoning Just Right.

ADVICE FOR MRS. NEWLYWED.

An Expert Tells How to Set About Measuring, Cooking and Creaming Different Ingredients—Timely Tips For a Food That Winter Demands.

Soup is such a necessary adjunct to the well-balanced meal that it deserves more care in its preparation than is usually accorded.

In serving soup remember that a hot, thin soup should be served with a hearty meat and a thick heavy soup should be served with a more simple one.

To make good soup the first requisite is a set of the necessary cooking utensils. These consist of a large agate-ware or aluminum soup kettle with a close fitting cover, a sharp meat knife, two pure strainers, one with a fine mesh and one with a coarse one, and a pair of scales. Next possible and always when hand the necessary spices and seasonings, such as bay leaves, peppercorns, salt and dry herbs, should be weighed and measured. They should be put in a small paper bag or a tin can with a cover, and kept in a cool, dry place.

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ASHES IN BROWN

These suits that are now being put up for winter are made with coats reaching to the knees and sometimes below that point. A few shorter lengths are also included in the models. Many of the coats are in fitted effect above the waist, with a considerable flare below that point. Others, however, are made in straight lines. A few of the more extreme suits are in a more or less fitted effect, with the fullness set on a very low waist line. On account of the length of the jacket the skirts of the suit are made on a straight, simple line. Many show plaited effects. Note pockets and belts appear on some of the skirts.

Grape Ketchup.

For grape-ketchup, wash the grapes and allow two pounds of sugar to ten pounds of grapes, a pint of cider vinegar and an ounce each of mace, cloves and cinnamon. Boil the sugar and vinegar for fifteen minutes and add to the pulp and skins, which have been heated through a colander to remove seeds and coddled; then boil all together in one pot for one hour. Boil slowly, and if too thick add a little more vinegar.

Transformations.

By means of a simple device, a low cut, tight-fitting coat can be transformed into a long, flowing, full-skirted gown. The device is a simple affair, consisting of a long, narrow strip of fabric, which is attached to the back of the coat. When the coat is worn, the strip is pulled up, and the skirt is formed. This is a very convenient and economical way of changing a coat into a gown.
