Grape Ketchup.

For grape ketchup, wash the grapes and allow two pounds of sugar to ten pounds of grapes, a pint of cider vinegar and an ounce each of mace, cloves and cinnamon. Boil the sugar and vinegar for fifteen minutes and add to the pulp and skins, which have been heated through a colander to remove seeds and coddled; then boil all together in one pot for an hour. Strain slowly, and if too thick add a little more vinegar.

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SOUP'S SECRETS.

The Art of Combining and Seasoning Just Right.

ADVICE FOR MRS. NEWLYWED.

An Expert Tells How to Set About Measuring, Cooking and Creaming Different Ingredients—Timely Tips For a Food That Winter Demands.

Soup is such a necessary adjunct to the well-balanced meal that it deserves more care in its preparation than is usually accorded.

In serving soup remember that a hot, thin soup should be served with a hearty meal, and a thick heavy soup should be served with a more simple one.

To make good soup the first requisite is a set of the necessary cooking utensils. These consist of a large agate-ware or aluminum soup kettle with a close fitting cover, a sharp meat knife, two pure strainers, one with a fine mesh and one with a coarse one, and a pair of scales. Next, procure and always keep on hand the necessary spices.
