

Good Rules for Party-Line Users

Good telephone service on party-lines depends very largely upon observance of the following rules:

1. Always consult the directory to be sure you call the right number.
2. Before calling listen to ascertain if the line is in use. If it is hang up your receiver promptly.
3. Don't interrupt your neighbor's conversation.
4. Answer only when you are called.
5. Don't hold the line too long—you can say 750 words in five minutes.
6. Be patient with the telephone operator.

By following these rules you will help improve the quality of party-line telephone service.
