Corn and Buckwheat Good Winter Feeds For Hens

An extra allowance of corn in the evening feed for hens when the weather promises to be severely cold is pretty good egg insurance. Buckwheat is another good addition to the diet in cold weather, but it is not relied like other grains.

Visit the houses at night and break up the habit some birds have of sleeping beneath the roosts. Teach them to roost on the perch, but first provide sufficient perch space for them. Perches only require about eight linear inches of perch space per bird, but it is better to allow twelve inches.

It is sometimes very hard to part with a flock of surplus cockerels, yet those who raise chickens for a profit cannot afford to be "chicken-hearted." It is poor policy to winter more male birds than are required for next season's breeders, plus those you feed occasionally to sell at a fair price.

Removing Common Stains

Alcohol will not spot the most delicate material and is safe to use in most cases where the source of the stain is unknown. Gine's stainer (it is) is used readily if the stain is colored and rubbed with a cloth soaked in alcohol.

To remove iron rust and spots from white clothing cover the spots with lemon juice and salt and leave for awhile in the sun. Sealding milk is often more useful in dissolving stains and turning white hot water and soap would fall bloodstains and usually disappear if washed in soap and tepid water, but in case of stubborn stains kerosene is frequently helpful.

Apply a piece of two parts of soft soap and powder starch to each part of salt and lemon juice to moisten will remove milk. The paste should be spread on both sides of the stain which should then be left in the sun to dry.
