Don't allow the cold winds of winter to leak through your doors and windows, making the house draughty and cold. A few weather strips will prevent all this.

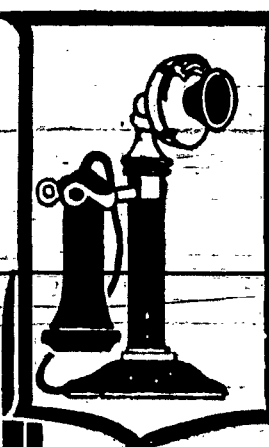
