AUTOS MAY ENTER CEMETERY

Bishop Hickey Announces Change in Holy Sepulchre Rule.

Automobiles, of the limousine type, will, after January 2, 1917, be allowed in Holy Sepulcher cemetery when accompanying funerals. This announcement was made by Bishop Thomas F. Hickey, president of the board of trustees.

For some time an agitation for the use of automobiles in the cemetery has been under way, but because of the roadways in the old cemetery, the use of automobiles was not considered. The newly opened parts of the cemetery have been laid out with specially constructed roadways which will permit the use of automobiles.

The reason for limiting the use of automobiles to the limousine type is that it lends dignity to the funeral and affords protection to the mourners, many of whom are in a weakened condition because of the strain of the funeral services.
