"The Devil's Work"

These idle society women who have permitted themselves to be inveigled into support of the renegade Catholic women who are preaching defiance to the laws of God may not realize that they are contributing toward another campaign against the Catholic Church, but that is what they are doing.

Having failed to wean Catholic's away from their Church by free meals and free clothing, they are now seeking to break down their faith by informing weak-minded women how to avoid having families. No matter how non-Catholic women may save their consciences, Catholic women know they are committing a mortal sin in following the advice of these wolves in sheep's clothing.

What this is, is well summed up in the following words from Rev. Bernard X. O'Reilly:—

"The present agitation for birth control is the natural sequence of eugenics, sex hygiene, twilight sleep and kindred movements which have nauseated the sensible public for the past few years. If one would believe the 'inspired' doctors and sociologists, the vast majority of us should never have been born. One would imagine that humanity was on the verge of physical and mental collapse which could be averted only by these supermen. They view man as nothing more than an animated machine. The question of morality or the supreme rights of God never enters their calculations. With a blasphemous egotism and monumental conceit that baffles comprehension, they assume the power to decide for the unborn child whether it is to be or not to be—the power of life and death.

"The argument most frequently brought forward by these advocates of birth control is an evil to bring these children to birth in abject poverty. While everything that will alleviate poverty should be done, birth control is no remedy. It is creating a greater evil. It not only robs the race and the nation, but brutalizes the individual by stultifying the natural desire for parenthood. The nation and the race want all the children they can get. God wants saints to serve Him and eventually be happy with Him. We must fight poverty, but we dare not fight nature, which is God.

"Birth control is a distorted and abnormal theory. Viewed from the standpoint of science and logic it is unprincipled and impracticable. In the light of morality it is—a crime and an abomination in the sight of God.

Would that we had more Catholics of the type of Dr. James J. Walsh who has confounded the would-be 'smart alecks' who have us believe men cannot be good Catholics and versed in science too.

"The Call of Christ."

In a recent issue "Truth", under the above caption, tells the real reason why some charges are made by uniformed persons against the Catholic Church:—

Sometimes it is charged that the Catholic Church is not sufficiently concerned with the social side of religion. It is charged that in her care for the doctrinal and liturgical she is neglectful of the practical example of Christ.

The reason for this unfounded opinion is that the Church does not advertise her charity to the world. The foundling asylums, orphanages, homes of the Good Shepherd, hospitals and homes for the aged, conducted by Catholic sisterhoods, are doing more charity than all the other philanthropic institutions in the country. If statistics of the work they are doing were published it would surprise those who are not familiar with Catholic charity and open the eyes of some of the enemies of the Church. They have no publicity bureau, but do their work quietly, knowing that Christ, for Whom they labor, will know and reward.

Not At All So.

Once more the bigots are circulating the falsehood that Pope Pius IX recognized the Southern Confederacy on the slim premise that he replied to a letter from Jefferson Davis and addressed the latter as "President of the Confederate States."

An exchange goes on to say that the Southern Confederacy itself did not so take the act of His Holiness. Judah P. Benjamin, Secretary of State in Mr. Davis' so-called Cabinet, writing under date of February 1, 1864, said:

"As a recognition of the Confederate States, we cannot attach to it (the Pope's letter) the same value that you do; a mere inferential recognition, unconnected with political action or the regular establishment of diplomatic relations, possessing none of the moral weight required for awakening the people of the United States from their delusion that these States still remain members of the old Union.

"Nothing will end this war but the utter exhaustion of the belligerents, unless, by the action of some of the leading powers of Europe in entering into formal relations with us, the United States are made to perceive that we are in the eyes of the world a separate nation, and that the war now waged by them is foreign to an intestine or civil war, as it is termed by the Pope.

"This phrase of his letter is only less concerned with the granting of pardons than with the imposing of the original sentence on the Confederate States' is a formula tence.

Under the existing system it is perfectly possible in fact, has been known—for a pardon to be granted and no information of the fact to be conveyed to the public for months. That implies the possibility of manipulation of politics, of scandal. Every Governor must bear the responsibility of deciding the cases, but the Governor who decides a case in secret and keeps secret thereof his decision avoids pretty successfully possibility of censure for an act adverse to the public interest. The better way is to have the applications heard in public and the decisions made a matter of public record.

May it not happen that if too much publicity is given to a pardon, he will not receive the chance to which he is entitled to "make good." Where, if undue publicity is avoided, he may secure a new position and make a new start.
