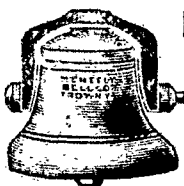

Interesting Budget of Happenings Gathered by Our City Reporters

St. Boniface.

The topic was relative to the Apostleship of Prayer, its origin and foundation, progress throughout the world; benefits, both spiritual and temporal and the various purposes of the organization were thoroughly explained, after which Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament was given. The next regular meeting of this League, for both the Promoters and members, will be held on Monday evening, January 22nd, at the Parish hall. Father Boppel, director-general of this League will give a lecture, and also make clear the intention for the League, which is recommended each month by His Holiness Pope Benedict XV. After the meeting, a social good time will be given by the officers of the League, the form of diversion and entertainment not to be announced until the night of the meeting, but there will be a royal good time in store for those in attendance. It is expected that a large number of the members and friends will come to this social gathering. Any new member contemplating admission into the Apostleship of Prayer, will kindly consult Father Boppel, director general, or any of the Promoters of the League, or by attending any of the meetings, the desired information will be gladly given, as new members are always welcome.

Announcement was made on last Sunday morning at all masses that owing to the poor condition of the interior of the church, it was proposed by a large number of the parishioners, that the interior of the church be decorated. 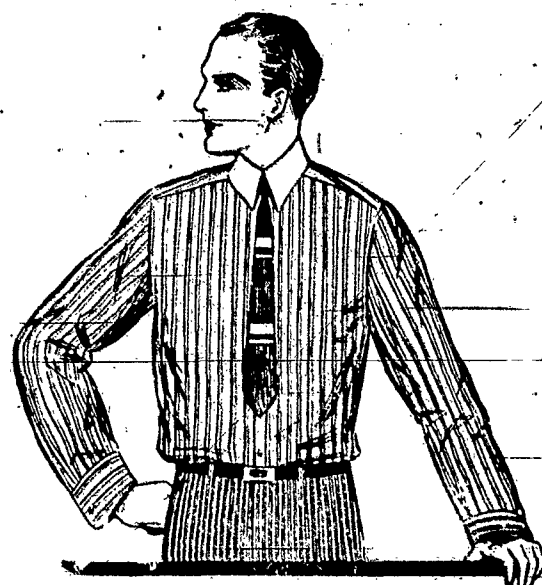
The members of the Young Ladies' Sodality will hold a Pedro party on Tuesday evening, January 23rd. Prizes will be given and lunch served.
