Great numbers were in attendance and a choice variety of linens were obtained for the Church Bazaar. This event was the first means of obtaining articles for the booths at the fair, and it was most pleasing to witness the happy and zealous workers that showed themselves eager to help in this good cause. The day morning at 8:30 from the and coffee was served and a number of willing musicians entertained with piano and vocal selections.

The Holy Name Society will go to Holy Communion in a body at the 7:30 o'clock mass Sunday morning, January 21st, the members to assemble in the Parish Hall at 7:15 o'clock. As it is only once a year that the members of this Society are under obligation to receive in a body, it is earnestly requested that each member will fulfill his duty.

According to the financial statement which was distributed on last Sunday, the parish income last year was \$38,023.42 total, including \$539.88 in the church at treasury on Jan. 1st, 1916. The largest single source of income was the regular Sunday offering which netted \$8,281. A subscription fund produced \$5,960.71. Pew rents, \$4,987.11 in quarterly payments and \$2,604.83 in weekly payments. School collections, \$2,616.21. Rents, \$9,390.19. Dividends and interests \$2,517.80. Entertainments produced \$1,675.29. Other items of income were in small amounts. Expenditures exclusive of taxes, repairs and other sundries amounted to \$9,360.19. For salaries, \$1,822.91; for diocesan collection and ordinary church expenses, \$25,090.07. Cash on hand Dec. 31, 1916 amounted to \$108.03. The parish debt was reduced from \$55,809.12 last year to \$41,809.12.

The rector Father Gefell was pleased and thanked the parishioners for the good work done and expects to double the amount this year.
