How to Get Rid of the Ants That Over-run Your Edibles.

How to Clean Ivory Ornaments When Yellow or Dusky.

When ivory ornaments become yellow or dusky wash them well in soap and water with a small brush to clean the carvings and then place them while wet in the sunshine.

How to Keep Flowers So They Will Travel Far.

To keep flowers fresh exclude them from air. To do this wet them thoroughly, put in a damp box and cover with wet cotton or newspaper, then place in a cool spot.

How to Bleach Clothes That Have Become Yellowed by Age.

When any white fabric becomes yellowed by age, it can be bleached by boiling in a solution of hydrogen peroxide.

Homely Wrinkles

After boiling salt beef leave two or three carrots in the liquor until cold. The carrots will absorb the salt, and the liquor can be used for soup.

To remove stains from puring rub the hands with the inside of apple or pear parings before using soap.

To clean water bottles put a tablespoonful of tea leaves and one of vinegar into the bottle and then fill with water. Shake, then let stand a little, after which rinse in clear water.

Limit the amount of meat for children if they are irritable, fretful and nervous. Give none at all after the noon hour if they wake up during the night.

To make a tough steak tender rub both sides with vinegar and olive oil and allow it to stand two hours before cooking.

The test for beating eggs for a sponge cake is to beat them until they are so dry the dish can be turned upside down.

Pork tenderloins roasted in the oven are improved by a sprinkling of powdered sage with salt and pepper.

WHY WOMEN TALK LONGER THAN MEN.

MEN.—A woman can talk longer than a man because she uses less force in speaking than the man does. A German professor has proved by actual and very delicate measurements that the baritone singer uses far more energy than the tenor and that the bass singer uses more force than either.

The range of voices differs greatly, so the percentage varies to the same extent, but as a result it was proved that the tenor uses only from one-seventh to one-sixteenth of the lung power of the baritone or bass.

The explanation is so simple that it is surprising that no investigation has not been made long ago. It has long been known that the tenor or soprano brings the vocal chords close together and keeps the edges only vibrating by the emission of air. The bass or contralto leaves the space between the chords wider open and has to vibrate very much more of the membranes, so that a considerably larger amount of air is required and much more force is expended.

Persons with high, squeaky voices often seem to be very loquacious, and the reason is now plain—they can talk with far less effort than those who take a deeper tone and have to use more air to utter their words.

Here lies the real explanation of the case with which a woman can outtalk a man. She has the advantage of using from one-seventh to one-sixteenth less lung power, and even though her lungs may be smaller the difference is never so great as that between the amounts of air required.

GROWING BULBS IN ROOMS.

Why the Markets Are Well Stocked at Reasonable Prices.

Lovers of flowers who live in flats, apartments or in houses where there are no yards for bulb planting can have their plants in their rooms. The wizards of the flower world have discovered that the rarest bulbs as well as the common ones grow their best in prepared fiber. This is fertilized and is cheap. Bulbs can be planted in this fiber in vases and bowls. The fiber is dampened from time to time, and nature does the rest.

In the last twenty-five years bulbs have never been as cheap as they now are, nor has the American market been supplied with a better quality than can be bought this season.

Why Water Gurgles When Poured From a Bottle.

Water or any other liquid cannot flow from a bottle in a steady stream because until the bottle is empty there is a continuous struggle between the tendency of the liquid to fall from the bottle and the rushing of the air to get in. When a full bottle without a cork is turned upside down there will be an alternate realization of two operations—the liquid to follow the attraction of gravitation and the air to obey its natural impulse to fill a void.

Why Thunder Follows Lightning Instead of Vice Versa.

When electricity is confined between two clouds and becomes cramped for room it "flashes" and we hear the "thunder." The heat generated by the electricity really causes violent convulsions of the air—the noise of which is thunder. As light waves move more rapidly than sound waves we see the "flash" before we hear the reverberation. That also applies to gunfire.
