"My New Curate" to be Given at Cathedral Hall.

On next Monday and Tuesday evenings, February 12 and 13th, the people of the Cathedral parish and their friends throughout the city will have an opportunity of seeing a typical Irish drama on the stage of Cathedral Hall.
